Foulness – Did you know? Rugwood and Burwoods

The farm or marsh of Rugwood is first mentioned in 1246 and by the late 1400s it had been incorporated into the manor of Foulness.

By the middle 1500s Rugwood, or certainly the land around it, was in the hands of the family of Lord Rich. They owned a large area of land, mostly in Essex, and at that time the rent for Rugwood was recorded as £15 for the farm or marsh.

In the middle 1800s, when a record was made of the uses the land was being put to, Rugwood was among those with the highest proportion of pasture.

Rugwood farmhouse dates from about 1750; this house replaced an earlier one on the site.

Although the land that eventually became the island of Foulness was used mainly for sheep pasture at first, it is recorded that by the middle 1700s a much greater proportion at Burwoods certainly was being used for arable farming. Writers on agriculture at the time are praising the quality of south-east Essex farming, and noting that wheat, beans, oats and mustard are being grown with a great return.

By the early nineteenth century, leases for land on Foulness, including that of Burwoods, stipulated that the crop rotation should be over a 6-year period, so year 1 was fallow, year 2 oats,

barley or white mustard, year 3 clover, 4 wheat, 5 beans or peas and year 6 wheat. Should the clover fail beans were to be grown instead.

First Responders

If anyone would like to restart the Community First Response Team for the island, please contact the Ambulance Service directly on 0345 6013733 and ask for the Community First Response coordinator.

They will explain what's required to become a First Responder.

I still have all equipment, except oxygen, and all the training equipment too. So there should be no start-up costs and we still have some funds in the account anyway. Tell the ambulance coordinator that you have everything ready to go.

If I don't hear from anyone, residents or Ambulance Service,

by the New Year, I will sell everything and donate proceeds to the Air Ambulance.
