In farming, the soil is fundamental. There are areas about the island where still can be detected the places where gypsum was piled after the '53 flood, ready to be used to try to get the soil back into good heart. But the sheer labour of man, muscle, machine and knowhow that goes into the preparation of the soil to produce the right crop is all important and consuming. On a much smaller scale, for example, the gardener will know that there are some soils that you can grow azaleas in, and other soils where the plant would curl up its toes and die immediately. Consider all that is needed, and Shredded Wheat can never be the same again; the way you think about food stuff we take for granted must bring a whole dimension of careful consideration and thanksgiving into a perspective of life.

Jesus talked about the importance of soil, paralleled from the production of crops, and went on to consider the ways in which your heart responds to God's love for each of us. What does it take to produce a heart that welcomes God's word and produces a good crop of a fruitful life in consequence? What ploughing and ground preparation are needed for us to get these hearts of ours more receptive to the deepest mysteries of life?

Perhaps you might ferret out that old Bible you have tucked away somewhere and re-read Mark chapter 4 v 20.

## Council Matters

Council approved the payment requests for the month of September and also noted the receipts for the month. Copies of both schedules can be found on our website.

Council considered a letter from the Essex Air Ambulance and agreed to make a donation of £50.

It was noted that the procedure to make payments in respect of

compensation claims regarding the major power failure on the Island had still not been finalised. Council expressed their disappointment at the time it was taking to finalise this matter.

The Clerk reported that, agreed. he had issued questionnaire to all parishioners to find out whether they would like some form of Post Office Service on the Island. Over 25% of parishioners had responded and the response had been 100% in favour of some form of post office services being provided. The Clerk would be writing to County Councillor Mike Steptoe to inform him of the outcome of the questionnaire.

The Clerk also advised that the External Audit report had been received with no comments or criticisms. A copy of the report has been posted to the notice boards and can also be found on the Parish Council website.

Councillor Tony Porter reported that he and Councillor Bob Green had attended the start of the Foulness bike ride.

## QinetiQ report

Early Start: DAT will start at 8.30am on 14<sup>th</sup> to 16<sup>th</sup> September and on 27<sup>th</sup> and 28<sup>th</sup> September.

Scrub clearance: this will take place at DAT on 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> October. This will involve land closures.

Essential Services: No power or water interruptions are expected.

Public Rights of Way: For the requirements of an on-going trial, Public Rights of Way in Land Areas 3 & 4 will remain closed.

Nazewick area trial: these trials will start again from 14<sup>th</sup> to 21<sup>st</sup> September and will possibly continue into October.

Tree work will be carried out in Churchend but the start date is dependent on receiving approval from Rochford District Council.

Verges are continuing to be cut.

Rotary Club Bike Ride: there had not been any reported incidents arising from this ride. Havengore Bridge: The bridge had been out of action for longer than expected on Saturday 9<sup>th</sup> September because the manual back-up system had failed. Measures were being put in place to ensure that this did not happen again.

## They lived on Foulness

#### Miss Phoebe Webb

Not exactly star of stage, screen and television, but there are several television programmes in which Phoebe figured, and more than one newspaper article; the Editor still has to hand the one in the Southend Star from 1962, in the days when Phoebe still cycled round to deliver the newspapers. The article was extolling in particular her skill in making home-made wines.

Among the many kindnesses she did, Phoebe would look after the three War Graves in the churchyard. One evening her bike was propped against the wall while she popped into the pub for a lemonade after grasscutting. Two local children mocked up a 'parking ticket' for the bike. Phoebe was sharp enough to know just who was responsible: when the papers were delivered the next day to the parents' house, they were embellished with a note: "Don't know if I can deliver tomorrow: I'm in court".

The producer of one of the television programmes in which

she appeared would always remember her birthday, and he made a special journey to attend her funeral when she died in her late 80s.

She lived in the same house in Churchend all her life and never lost her strong Foulness accent. At one point in her life she worked for Mrs Eliza Belton at Hall Farm, and a visitor to the Heritage Centre a few years ago recounted how Phoebe had told her that Mrs Belton had remonstrated with her for not having polished the brass studs on the mattress when cleaning. How life has changed!

## Have you tried ...

On the spur of the moment we decided to have an evening meal at Mim Spice in Wakering. Although it was a Friday night we were able to get a table without a booking. However the restaurant was busy so a reservation would be advisable in future.

We had the inevitable poppadoms as an appetiser. They came with the usual selection of pickles and chutneys – all very enjoyable accompanied with good conversation.

For the first course I had the Tandoori Lamb Chops which were delicious with a lovely crispy skin. My wife had the Chicken Pakora which she said was excellent.

I struggled to choose a main course from the extensive list of Chef's Specialities. In the end I plumped for the Amm Bujon, which is a sweet dish of chicken cooked with almonds and mango in a sauce, topped with honey. I had this with a portion of pilau rice. The chicken was really tender and the sweet sauce had just the right gentle amount of spice for me.

My wife and 2 year old daughter both had the *Kuku Coco Paka*, a dish supposedly from Nepal. It's chicken, cooked with coconut and fresh cream. My daughter likes a curry spicier than I do and cleared her entire plate – clearly she enjoyed it!

We do have to say that service was a bit slow, no doubt because the restaurant was so busy. The wait between courses certainly wasn't excessive and we'd taken some toys to keep our daughter entertained so she was happy.

Mim Spice's extensive menu is available for take-away. The food is based on the Bangladeshi cuisine, and it's possible to order online and then collect the takeaway. We'll certainly try it the next time we're feeling too lazy to cook.

And finally .... Three churches in town were overrun by squirrels. After much prayer, the elders of the first church determined that the animals were predestined to be there. Who were they to interfere with God's will? The elders did nothing, and the squirrels multiplied.
